



Field of Dreams. What a great movie. Released in 1989 with a stellar cast of stars, the most commonly used quote in the movie is "If you build he will come." However, many people misquote it, saying, "If you build it they will come."

He was Shoeless Joe Jackson, a dead 1918 baseball player, one of the alltime greats; the idol of Kevin Costner. Most people think the voice was talking about all the townspeople.

How did the people of the town know about this special baseball field located nowhere, out in the middle of an Iowa corn field? Word of mouth -- not paid advertising on radio, TV or in the newspaper. They streamed in by the thou-





The first lesson: Let's step back and look at what the public's first image of your club is on the web. Check out your website. Take a new look at it as though this was your first time there. How long ago was it created? Is it fresh and kept up to date? When someone lands on your home page do they get an easy overall view of what, when and where you offer programs of interest? Who you are? Is there something of interest that strikes them quickly?

When I was thinking about this article I went to our site. Our website <u>www.rpcug.org</u> was created in 1995. It has been visited 48,918 times according to the counter that no one puts on a website anymore for public view.

I found that we were making a serious error of "we know who we are so everyone should know."

What we didn't do was tell everyone who the Rockland PC Users Group is and what we offer right up front. People had to dig down or rather make another decision to go further; that was the first place we could lose a potential member. I wrote a few paragraphs with bullet points about RPCUG and Project PC ReNew that we have run for 11 years. Not too wordy. Straight to the point and within 30 seconds you know enough to whet your appetite or let you decide if you are interested. No need to drill down through our site to figure us out.

For over 25 years we built it; our membership is still built one at a time. We offer education, expertise and a community service project that reaches out to over 125 non-profits in a county of 300,000 people. We teach in libraries and senior citizen groups and win awards that get us publicity in the local media. So what If no one knows they won't come to our ball field let alone play in it.

If you have a question about marketing or a success story please send it to me for future articles. I will try to feature it and give a tip per article. APCUG has additional marketing tools you can use as a member benefit. Let's all play ball together and fill all our ball fields with members... not just in the stands. \odot

PRESENTING WITHOUT A COMPUTER

For your group's meetings, do you hate packing up your computer and taking it to the meeting room? What a pain in the neck. Even a netbook gets heavy. There's got to be a better alternative. Have you thought about using your tablet or smartphone? If it has a video connection and you have the cable to attach to a projector, you're ready to go. For my user group meetings, I just carry my iPad 2. You can also use other iDevices or Android devices.

Here's how . . .

Websites – Using the web browser on your device, you can bring up any web page.

Videos – These can be a little tricky. I usually have three or four videos I want to show. On my iPad, there is a standalone YouTube app, but you have to search and find videos one at a time. I plan ahead and build a web page like the one at http://www.gcpcug.org/sept2012. It has all the web page links and videos I plan on showing. By giving out the page link, the attendees can watch the videos and explore the links after the meeting.


You need to know how to embed videos on a web page. In the 2012 2nd Quarter of Reports, I explained how to do this. See http://reports.apcug.org/2012q2/14.htm

PowerPoint – Many presentations are created in Microsoft PowerPoint. The iPad has an app called Keynote (\$9.99) that will convert and open PPT files. The problem is that sometimes the fonts and layout do not always convert well. There are rumors that Microsoft is coming out with an Office iPad app, but it is not here yet.

What are the alternatives?

CloudOn (http://site.cloudon.com/) is a free app available for iOS and Android. It gives you Word, Excel and PowerPoint. Your files can be stored in Dropbox or Google Drive.

CloudOn lets you format text, change fonts and catch that typo, but imagine being able to track changes while editing Word documents, use pivot tables and insert formulas in Excel and present your PowerPoint slides complete with transitions.

Another feature is the ability to view PDFs. You also have a universal viewer that lets you view virtually any file – from raw Photoshop images to everyday image files like PNG, JPEG and GIF.

SlideShark (https://www.slideshark.com) is a free / paid PowerPoint viewer app for the iPad and iPhone. Your PPT files are stored in the cloud. They can be displayed as they were meant to be seen. The app can preserve animations, fonts, graphics and colors.





Getting Your Files on Your Tablet / Smartphone

It seems to kick off their Q&A in a light-hearted manner and reminds the audience that they aren't the only one with computer problems.

Miscellaneous Ideas

- Do you take pictures of your presenters and put a recap of the presentation in the next month's newsletter? This is an opportunity to give the vendor additional publicity or another thank you to the member who gave a presentation and a nudge to other members about making a presentation.
- Do you give a vendor a thank you certificate after the presentation—another picture op and the vendor has something tangible to show their supervisor. Some groups give a more tangible reminder of the presentation such as a coffee cup.
- Do you give your members an O'Reilly eBook certificate for giving a presentation? They can then choose the book of their choice.
- Do you treat your vendor presenters to a meal prior to the meeting? Glendora's Computer Club, CA, takes their presenters to Flappy Jacks on Route 66. I even get treated to breakfast when I make a presentation at their club.
- Does your group take field trips? Don't forget to include pictures of the trips in your newsletter and also include pictures of the fun you are having at your fundraisers.
- Does your group get together for a small group meeting over breakfast or another meal? Don't forget to include pictures of the attendees in the next issue of your newsletter.
- Are you looking for a new meeting location? Several groups in California meet either at Denny's or Coco's restaurants. They have private meeting rooms and feature free Wi-Fi. WHY YOUR USER GROUP SHOULD HAVE A YouTube CHANNEL



Many groups are making video recordings of their meeting presentations. Putting the videos on the web is a great resource for your members and great marketing. The problem is where to put the recordings on the web. There are bandwidth and storage issues with many hosting companies.

YouTube is a great solution. It's free and has none of the other issues. The only issue used to be that videos couldn't be longer than 15 minutes. There's a way around that by verifying your account and not having any reported copyright issues. Once you do that, the 15 minutes problem goes away.




APCUG has its own channel at http://www.youtube.com/apcugvideos where we have videos from several of the recent virtual technology conferences. Several member groups already have their own channels as well. Check out the Hilton Head Island Computer Club at http://hhicc.org/Videos.aspx; their YouTube channel is at http://www.youtube.com/hhiccvideos

So what is involved? First you need to create a YouTube account for your group. Understand that YouTube uses account and channel interchangeably. This needs to be a separate account from your personal account, otherwise you create issues with YouTube that you don't need. Go to http://www.youtube.com/. Sign out of your personal account if you have one. Look for the create account link in the upper right corner and go through the process of creating an account. You will need to create a new gmail address to use for your login. Try to use a descriptive name for the YouTube account that is short and simple; it will be part of your YouTube address.

Once the account or channel is created, go into settings and customize. Upload your group's logo for example. Now you need to get the account verified. YouTube wants to make sure you are not a bot, among other things. Also, they want to make sure that you understand their regulations about copyrights. Go to the Upload page.


You should see a link to "increase your limit." Click it



Select your country and enter your mobile number. If you have used your mobile number before with YouTube or Google, you may need to borrow someone else's number. Remember it needs to be able to receive text messages. Click Submit. Within a few minutes, you should receive a code in a text message. Enter the code like in the example below and click Verify.

PROBLEMS WITH AUDIO DURING ONLINE MEETINGS AND WEBINARS

I am involved with many online meetings and webinars where the attendees need to hear and speak. Some of the services use telephones for the audio, but many of them are not toll free and callers with no landline are also using valuable minutes, as well. Most of the services include VoIP or Internet audio access for both listening and talking.

If the attendees are to speak during a meeting or webinar, then it is vital that the equipment is tested prior to the session and that it works properly. Many of the services have a testing link, but often that does not include testing of items that are the real issues.

The real issues include echo/feedback and the microphone volume. While Skype and other conversation services work fine in a one-to-one basis, when you add several people to the mix, you begin to get echoes and sometimes a feedback noise. One of the best ways to fix this is to ask all of the participants to use headsets.

However, I am finding that the use of headsets still does not totally resolve the issues. Probably the most prevalent reason is that someone does not admit that they are not using a headset. It feels uncomfortable and they just do not want to wear one. This makes trouble-shooting for the meeting people very difficult. But, once that is resolved, there may still be an echo and finding out why has been one of my goals.

I have searched & researched the issue and there is no definitive answer. Even with all of the participants using headsets, there can still be issues of echoing. In my research, I have even determined who was the cause. In those cases, the participant assured me that they were using a name brand of

headset and that it was not a cheap set. I have had several people try 2 or 3 headsets and only one worked properly.

Although unscientific, I have come to a conclusion that I cannot substantiate. My conclusion is that many of the drivers for headsets are not totally compatible with all of the services and computer set ups. I am seeing that many of the brand-name headsets have their own drivers that are installed and still echo, while many of the cheapie sets do not feed back.

Those of us who buy and try lots of "stuff" probably have more than 1 headset and can try different sets to get one that works. Most attendees just want it to work. If it does not or if they are frustrated with the noises, they just go away and do not attend again.

For those who gave up, try again with another setup. You may find that the issue was on your end and can be fixed. There are some things that you can try. Turn down the sound volume. If you turn it up too loud, there may be sound leakage around your ears and causing the echo. Use a headset with ear buds or that go over the whole ear. Also check your microphone to make sure that you are using the correct one, as there may also be a mic on your webcam, and your system is also using that microphone. Also check your microphone levels. They are not usually controlled in the same places as your speaker/earphones are controlled. In Windows you have to go to Control Panel & Sounds, and depending on which version, find the recording levels. I am sure that Macs also have microphone controls to adjust the mic levels up or down.

As we try new and different tools to communicate just be patient and remember that they do not always have this stuff nailed down. \odot

HELPING YOUR USER GROUP BE A SUCCESS

Being an APCUG Advisor has always been a rewarding experience for me. In this position I have met and talked with many members and officers of user groups and find that each group is unique and special and that their officers and board members try hard to meet their member's needs. But there are always several underlying themes that are shared with me and those are finding officer volunteers, attracting new membership and programming. These are very critical areas of concern that affect the life and continuation of any organization. Whether it is a PC User Group, Rotary Club, Kiwanis Club or the local book club, in today's world all of these organizations are facing the exact same problems, lack of volunteers, declining membership and finding program content. They are all struggling to solve the problems: but unfortunately many at some point give up and throw in the towel. In my opinion 'being done' is not the solution at least I hope not. What it requires is innovation and thinking 'outside of the box'.

I know that you can't force anyone to do what they do not want to do, but you can at least raise the questions of 'how important is this group to you'? Or 'how would you cope without it'? And 'are you willing to invest some time in making this organization a success'? Any members that can answer yes to one of those questions are potential volunteers. They may need a little nudge or mentoring, but they can step up to the plate and help with your group's needs. Whether volunteering to run for office, provide a program or just be a 'cheerleader' -- all are vital roles.

One of the first things you hear so often is I'm not a leader, or I can't get up in front of an audience. These are valid arguments but. in my mind, everyone has something to share and with a little prodding and nudging you can encourage someone to step up to the plate. If you are recruiting for your club for volunteers to be an officer or to give a presentation, approach the task carefully in selecting tasks that fit an individual's personality and skill. Don't take the first no as the final answer, use a little flattery to encourage them to reconsider their decision. Keep in mind to not try to encourage someone to be president if they are too new to the club unless that individual possesses leadership

skills that are recognizable right away and likewise don't dismiss someone you think might be too old or in your opinion not know enough to contribute – asking is the key and persuasion is the solution.

User groups are about sharing and being able to help each other. Be open to new ideas, don't let customs or traditions stand in the way of putting forth new ideas. After all, you are a computer club, and technology changes all the time. Even though the majority of our members might be using older operating systems that does not mean that you cannot show them some of the features of the newer operating systems. But be mindful that anything new that is offered should be in small doses. Don't overwhelm your members with totally new concepts. Try to bridge the old with the new.

These are just some thoughts to consider, always keep in mind that APCUG offers a number of benefits that are designed to help your User Group. If you haven't checked out the list of benefits, do so. There are programs, webinars and YouTube videos that you can access to help your programming efforts. There are quarterly online conferences that your members can attend from their home. These are just some of the benefits that you get for your \$50 dollar membership.

Request for Membership-Management Software

I was asked to relay this inquiry for groups that have a computer-based membership system, and would be willing to share with another group. A group leader commented: It seems we should get a little more "with it" than we are currently, and use tools we espouse to do the real work of the club. And surely, some group out there has something in place they might be willing to share, to allow us to avoid reinventing the wheel. So, if you have or know of such software -- let me know and I'll pass the information on, and likely write it up in the next Reports.

Add One, Subtract One

It's gratifying seeing new computer clubs and user groups organized -- refuting the idea that user groups and such organizations in general have passed from the scene. I'm especially happy when new clubs find APCUG and recognize the benefits of the bargain (\$50/year!) membership. So I enjoyed meeting -- along with long-time WACUG/PATACS volunteer Paul Howard -- with members of the newly organized Potomac Green Computer Club in Ashburn, VA, providing suggestions for club organization/operation and arranging to speak there this past July.

Equally and opposite, I hate seeing APCUG lose member clubs -- for whatever reason, whether disbanding or simply moving on. But recently, there was a positive cause and outcome to a membership loss: two groups, WACUG (Washington Area Computer User Group) and NCTCUG (National Capital Technology and Computer User's Group), kindred in many ways (shared members, interlocking officers, partnered equipment) have merged to form PATACS (Potomac Area Technology and Computer Society). This resulting group will continue providing the best of the two groups (multiple monthly meetings, newsletter, PC clinic, etc.) while being strengthened by a more substantial membership of 100+ and a Board with about 15 active volunteers. This merger wasn't undertaken lightly -- and it took substantial effort aligning organizational documents and dealing with government requirements. But PATACS is stronger than either of the two groups and is well positioned to serve the Northern Virginia community from now on. So, if your group is near another with similar orientation, consider whether you also can find "strength in numbers" to combine efforts.

Highlighting Smooth Operation

I'm biased -- I'm a member and Director, and the group's APCUG Representative -- but I find WACUG to be one of the most-efficient user groups I attend or know about, with standard formats for Board minutes, meeting agendas, the speakers/topics pipeline, etc.

The group also provides concise instructions for speakers, giving meeting procedures, directions to meetings, key person contact information, and -- a nice touch -- promises a reserved/named parking space.

WACUG uses donated O'Reilly e-books as speaker appreciation gifts; other groups provide various forms of recognition -- locally oriented gifts, gift cards, certificates, letters of appreciation, regalia, and invitation to yearly awards banquets. These all demonstrate to speakers how valuable they are to user groups.
