Leisure World Tech

Leisure World is a gated 55+ active senior country club-like community established in Silver Spring, Maryland, some 50+ years ago and added to ever since. Features include a golf course, clubhouses, restaurants, pools, tennis courts, and amenities too numerous to mention. There are currently 8,000+ residents.

In the 1980s, with the emergence of personal computers, a Computer Center facility was established and equipped with PCs, printers, scanners, and Wi-Fi to provide residents with equipment to learn on and use. Tech-savvy volunteers managed the center and helped residents not familiar with new technologies.

As Macintosh computers became prevalent, an Apple Club was formed to assist those users to understand better and use their equipment. The Club held monthly meetings and clinics where hints, tips, and problems were addressed through talks and presentations.

In 2018, the Computer Center partnered with the Apple Club, whose members were more sophisticated computer users who wanted to use their equipment better through training programs and talks. By this time, new digital devices emerged, including iPads, iPhones, Android phones, laptop and tablet computers of all makes and models, home assistants, and streaming TV devices. It was quickly recognized that these all needed to be addressed.

Accordingly, in 2022 the Apple Club merged with the Computer Center to better integrate physical facilities with the Apple training programs, which grew to cover not only Apple products but topics on security, scams, backups, popular word processing, spreadsheet, photo editing, and other software applications, as well as the plethora of new digital devices.

The merged entity adopted the name Leisure World Tech. The Computer Center was renamed as Technology Resource Center, and new devices were purchased for training and use, including printers, laptops, desktops, and home automation devices.

On average, two training sessions are offered monthly for all Leisure World residents, both in-person and by Zoom streaming. A large-screen TV supports Zoom presentations. Programs are announced and advertised in the Leisure World bi-monthly newspaper and sent to the LWT mailing list's over 150 recipients.

Leisure World Tech's mission is to support LW residents to better use digital devices in their everyday lives. <u>https://www.computerctr.org/</u>

Introducing the Sterling Heights Computer Club (SHCC) from Sterling Heights, Michigan.

SHCC was started by a group of 12 people in 1988 after hearing a presentation on a virus protection software. They decided there needed to be a group that would help others learn about computers and technology.

SHCC is a group that always seemed to be looking for a "home." Over the years, they called several different places home. But they always seemed to be looking for a new location. They were first required to move because the main tenant needed more room for their needs and took the place SHCC called home for many years. They moved because the place they were in was sold. They had to move because they needed a bigger meeting location (that was a good thing). As technology changed, they needed to move to access the Internet (another good thing). They had to move again because their meeting location was being shut down. Moves were required because of increased rental rates. They arrived back at a previous location (the one that was sold and bought) but later had to leave due to decreasing membership. And to prove that what goes around comes around, the current place they call home is across the street from where they started their club 35 years ago.

During their many years, they started and dissolved many Significant Interest Groups (SIG). They had a variety of groups that met to discuss and learn about Apple, Prodigy, Small Business, and the Internet. This group met to maintain computers at the local library, Linux and Windows. But due to decreases in enrollment, like other groups, these SIGs hibernate, hoping to return in the future.

Although membership is not at the previous level, SHCC built up a reputation for delivering value and education to those attending their meetings. They survived the COVID years and are still meeting monthly (except in July and August). They are lucky they have several local members willing to give presentations and can get some outside people to present, like the officer of the local police department presenting the program on Cyber Security and Computer Fraud. They've recently had programs on the most talked about topic of AI, Windows Tools, and Accessing Files through dual booting with Linux.

With only three officers (they are looking for a secretary) leading the group, SHCC also has five people willing to be listed as "Resource People," offering to provide specific help in different technology areas. They also have a "Coordinators" team who greet people at meetings and staff a welcome/check-in table. They publish a monthly newsletter called "WYSIWYG" that is sent to all members digitally, or for an extra fee, they can receive a printed copy. In a recent email that I sent to Region 8 groups, I asked to be updated on group activities so that I could share those activities with other APCUG members. Pat Aucoin, President of the Cajun Clickers, was the first and only respondent to my email reporting a project her group is pursuing. Their group has partnered with the Grandparents Raising Grandchildren Information Center of Louisiana to help grandparents with their devices and be available statewide to help in any way possible. Their first step is to get everyone familiar with ZOOM. GRGICL has gotten a grant to pay for membership since so many of their grandparents have so many other expenses.

You may not be familiar with GRG, but Grandparents raising grandkids is a family phenomenon that has increased in recent decades, often due to family crises and other sociopolitical issues. Grandparents who have the primary responsibility for caring for their grandchildren face various challenges, such as limited income, emotional stress, and legal issues. There are also resources and support available for these grandparents, such as the Advisory Council to Support Grandparents Raising Grandchildren, which aims to share information, advocate, and respect the diversity of these families.

GRG is not unique to Louisiana. 70 million grandparents are living in the United States. More than 1 in 10 grandparents have a grandchild living with them, according to AARP's 2018 Grandparents Today National Survey. Of the 70 million grandparents in the United States in 2018, about 10 percent lived with grandchildren, up from just 7 percent in 1992, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. In 2019, the U.S. Census Bureau reported the percentage of grandparents raising grandchildren was highest in states with higher opioid prescription rates.

Getting involved with a GRG project is an excellent community outreach project for a group. Many benefits could be honed from this effort, gaining new members, getting your members involved with a community project as well as allowing members to show off their computer skills.

The Computer Club of Oklahoma City is also working on a community project partnering with CARE for Afghan families. CARE is an international organization that works around the globe to save lives, defeat poverty, and achieve social justice. There will be more information on this project in future 'Reports.'

On a different note, I want to emphasize that your APCUG advisor is genuinely interested in your group's success. As a benefit of membership, APCUG is eager to help in any way possible. If your group requires a presentation, your advisor can offer support by delivering one either in person or via Zoom. APCUG

also provides valuable resources that your club can utilize. The APCUG Speaker's Bureau continuously adds new and engaging presentations monthly. If you haven't explored these offerings, your group may be missing out on some terrific presentations that are free to member groups for the asking.

Moreover, the APCUG website has recently been updated with a new design. While visiting the website, I encourage you to review the User Group Locator Service (UGLS) and ensure that your officers' contact information is current. This database is used to send out newsletters and other communications to our groups. Rest assured, we respect your privacy and won't inundate you with unnecessary emails.

SuperCom Computer Club (<u>https://www.supercomcc.org/</u>)



Meet SCCC

The idea for a computer club at Super Sun began in 1995 when Al Bentley volunteered to start a computer club with Shirley Ekblad's encouragement. In 1995 computers were a relatively "new thing," and people knew little about them. However, the first official meeting of the SuperCom Computer Club was held on March 30, 2001—six years later. With blessing from the Park Activities Director, a group of people met regularly and discussed different fundamental computer-related issues-- as basic as "How to turn it on." There were no officers, and there were no by-laws for this group. Since there was no secretary, there was no written report for the activities of this group. This group initiated "Red Friday" to honor our troops. They had presentations similar to what we have today at each meeting.

Donated "hand-me-down" and broken computers and printers were used since there was no money for this Activity. With the promise of reimbursement from the Activities Director, Al Bentley bought two computers for \$200 each. Al also purchased a digital projector on eBay at a very low price that was used for dissertations until the bulb burned out. Service on the projector revealed that it was "hot" and a new bulb would cost \$400. There was still no money for the Club to spend, so a bulb was not purchased. Shortly after that, Al Russell's son provided a projector.

Several ladies who attended this group participated in bake sales, clam chowder soup sales, and various other sales to earn money for necessary purchases. When it was discovered by the Activities Office the excellent service such a group/club could render to the park, it was suggested that the group form a club with by-laws. Al Bentley and several others had attended computer club programs at SilverCom at Silveridge RV Park. Using this name as an example, our Club is officially named SuperCom Superstition Sunrise Computer Club. Our new by-laws were written using the by-laws of SilverCom as a format.

At the March 30, 2001 meeting, the first officers were nominated and installed: Al Bentley, Chairman; Vera Parsons, Secretary / Treasurer; Clair Johnson, Member at Large; Tom Cutler, Member at Large. Dues began to be collected, and the Activity Director secured a space for the Club to do whatever they needed to make a good lab.

The club logo was formed from Al Bentley's picture of Superstition Mountain. The logo was designed by Don Berg, Ed Collins' son-in-law, a chainsaw artist. He had come to visit a group program and put his artistic talent to work sketching a letterhead icon for the Club.

Our first "Geeks," Jim Oliver and Dick Strong, designed and equipped our current Lab 1 This Club was based on the concept that we could learn from each other---What one person knew, he could relay to the person who did not know how to do a specific action. This was not a club just for Geeks and computer nerds. Nobody knows everything, but we are willing to share what we know.

Meetings began informally in the La Paz room, moved to the Apache Room, and now are held in the Ballroom --- the largest room in the park. These meetings feature speakers who inform us of a wide range of subjects and always give us tips on keeping our computers safe and running efficiently.

As the Club grew, we opened our first computer lab in 2005 with seven networked computers and began offering basic computer lessons.

The more we learned about our computers and their capabilities, the more training we needed and desired; such as how can I make an address book; how can I merge my address book with my Christmas lists; how can I make my own Christmas cards; how can I find out about who my ancestors were? Inquiring minds wanted to know, so those who knew the answers to these questions offered their talents in this area and developed a class to cover each subject that the Club wanted to be addressed.

With each new class comes the need for volunteers to provide this class, not only to teach it but to monitor the class. The teacher depends on this helper who works in the background to keep the class moving smoothly.

Internet usage became a must, and this Club was extremely instrumental in the progression and quality of the internet service offered by the park.

The demand for classroom time increased so much that the second computer lab was opened in the fall of 2007.

Technology continued to invade our lives, and in our efforts not to be left behind, we found ourselves finding SIGS (Special Interest Groups) were a necessity: Smart Phones, I-Pads, cameras that were smarter than we were, programs that we use but do not know how to use them to their fullest benefit.

One of our greatest achievements is this website. It so fully relays the Club's objectives and offerings, as well as introduces you to the driving forces behind the Club.

- User solutions for devices without browsers, e.g., smart lights, smart power outlets, and digital assistants. Where Matter comes in.

April - *Smartphones & Tablets: Educational Distractions or Bicycles for Our Minds?* Rich McCue, MA, BComm, gave an excellent presentation on April 25th, courtesy of the University of Victoria University Speakers Bureau. The answer to the presentation title question is Yes, smartphones and tablets can be a huge distraction if unskillfully used, and yes, they can be wonderful learning tools or bicycles for our minds if used skillfully. Rich is the Libraries Digital Scholarship Commons manager, Sessional Instructor, Faculty of Education.

Another **April** workshop by George Bowden was on *Spring Cleaning* (a presentation I think we should give to our groups every spring/JT). It's Spring! Time to take a look at your computers, laptops, tablets, or cell phones to ensure you all have current updates. Regardless of whether you have Microsoft Windows, Apple, Android, or Chrome devices, they all need updates. Clear out the clutter, clean the screens, wipe the keyboards – don't put any liquids on the devices – just on the microfiber cloth. Always use the proper cleaning solution from a computer store.

At one of their **April** meetings, I gave a presentation on *Declutter Your Digital Life*. You spend a lot of money on your equipment – learn to optimize your devices to make them last longer and help you be more productive. Unfortunately, digital clutter slows down your computer over time, and routine device decluttering is necessary for top performance. Judy's presentation showed us how to declutter our digital life and be more organized to work Faster, smarter, and less stressed.

User Groups Three Years After Covid

Covid inflicted diverse hardships and devastation -- from more than a million deaths to many businesses -- restaurants especially -- disappearing. Among the consequences were sudden changes to user groups and technology clubs. Some disbanded when in-person meetings became impossible, many suspended meetings and are now exploring coming out of hibernation, some moved online and will stay there, and others evolved to hybrid operation, accommodating people who won't attend physically and those who don't join online.

Having been an APCUG Advisor for over a decade, I long ago stopped believing there's only one correct way to run user groups. So, the only outcome above that I dislike is groups ceasing operation. Meeting only online is generally simpler technically but loses the charm, energy, and community of in-person gatherings and precludes those unwilling or able to be online from attending. Meeting only in person

excludes those not able or interested in travel or in being in group settings. Hybrid meetings welcome all comers but can require more technology and effort to operate successfully.

I've seen hybrid meetings conducted from enterprise-class settings with tens of thousands of dollars worth of equipment, historic buildings with Rube Goldberg (no relation!) equipment set up with ratsnest cabling, and (my favorite) minimalist and yet successful technology. I've presented using only a group's Wi-Fi connection and projector and my iPad showing slides with iPhone mirroring slides to Zoom. So, hybrid meetings needn't be an overwhelming challenge.

Hybrid Meetings Mean Distance Doesn't Matter

As more groups meet online or in a hybrid format, people discover how easy it is to attend meetings nationwide or worldwide. https://apcug2.org/group-sharing-meetings/ lists, by time zone, groups allowing members of other groups to attend meetings.

Hybrid Meetings Can Provide Information, Entertainment, Community, and Friends

While too many groups suffer the loss of members, many find that age-old ways of finding and recruiting new members don't work. So, it's worth exploring new places to "fish" for members. <u>https://tinyurl.com/2jrazr9d</u> is titled, "I'm retired, and I don't drive. How do I fill and face the days ahead?" Surely the answer for some people will be by attending user group meetings. Most communities have government programs for seniors, senior communities, and senior-oriented publications. Find those covering your area, introduce your group, and offer to provide material about your group. Emphasize that your group is a senior-friendly setting for getting tech advice and help, staying current, learning to be safe online, and making friends.

Knock, knock -- if you don't ask...

It's easy getting to know -- and making friends with -- your local technology stores. Several years ago, I met the manager of a local electronics store -- by complaining to the chain's headquarters about something the store had done very wrong! He called me a few days later, horrified and apologetic -- and intent on making things right. And he did -- he became a good friend to www.wap.org and www.patacs.org, offering meeting space and discounts to group members. And he donated a coupon worth \$200 for a free PC build, using components purchased at the store, that PATACS raffled. As he's moved up the chain, he's staying in touch and ensuring the new manager knows about and supports user groups. You needn't look for trouble at these stores; more pleasant ways exist to introduce user groups as potential partners. Pitch what your group can do for stores, such as distributing their flyers and mentioning them for tech support and service. In return, stores might offer meeting space, raffle prizes, routine or special discounts, etc. If you don't introduce and ask, you won't get it.

Mailing Lists are User Group Community Glue

In the last few years, I've encouraged multiple groups to create groups.io groups/lists, helped start them, and watched them take off. I've mostly stayed subscribed and have enjoyed seeing each list take on unique characteristics shaped by group culture and individuals participating. I've subscribed to groups.io lists for list owners and the service's beta testers, giving me tips on list operation and problem solutions. It's clear that the company intends this to be a premiere list-hosting platform. While there are priced service tiers, the free level is more than adequate for user groups.

If your group doesn't have a discussion mailing list, it's worth creating one. While hosting is available on several websites, I believe that groups.io is the best, simplest, and most popular. It takes just a few minutes to create a groups.io list using their decent default options/settings; it's easy at any time to

customize/tweak lists to your group's and members' specifications. I'm trying to emulate how a group member referred to this facility as "gio" -- much faster than mouthing the full groups-dot-I-O. I hope this catches on.

Many groups allow non-members to subscribe, which benefits the groups themselves and the broader user group community. APCUG can only do so much in sharing information across groups, crosspollinating ideas. So, reading diverse groups' lists (in digest form to reduce email clutter) gives me plenty of material to share with my two local groups.



Highlight Community Service Programs, Services, Contributions

Many groups contribute in diverse ways to their communities -- after all, that's required of non-profit organizations. Some groups recycle/refurbish/donate computers, others provide scholarship assistance to students in technology fields, and one ran the only non-smoking bingo in their town. Such programs are a great way to introduce your group to the broader community and do some well-earned self-back-patting. Washington Apple Pi endowed an annual scholarship at George Mason University and invites each year's winner to a meeting to describe their studies and plans, chat with members, and receive group membership. Group members enjoy Such introductions as much as the scholarship winners.

What Could Your Group Do with a Bit More \$\$\$?

Many businesses, government agencies, and non-profit organizations provide community service grants. An example is Cox Charities Grants, through which each year, Cox employees donate via recurring payroll deductions and one-time gifts. Funds raised are then awarded annually to organizations impacting our communities. Employees review grant applications and make funding recommendations and decisions.

Charitable organizations providing human services in Virginia, North Carolina, and the Washington Metropolitan Area are invited to apply. Recipients are selected by considering several factors, including:

- The overall significance of the project
- The proposal clearly explains what makes this program unique
- The ability to define clear metrics for success

Look around in your area -- locality, state, region -- for potential sources of funds. And be creative in crafting proposals matching your group's mission and funding source criteria.
