President's Message

Open Transparent Services for Our Members

My name is Kathy Jacobs. For the past two years, I have been the Vice President of APCUG. This month, the Board of Directors voted me in as the President. I thought that for my first president's message, I would share my thoughts on what we need to do as an organization to come back together.

The short version:

We need to become an open organization. We need to offer services that you, our member groups need and want. We need to communicate with you more than we ever have. We need to offer training and content you can use with your organization. We need to offer online services that help your organization become the best it can be.

How will the BOD change?

One of the frustrations I have heard loud and clear from the member groups is that we need to share our basic financial information with you more frequently and more completely. You need to see the budget, the spending, the income, and the financial plans we have for the organization. You don't want to see just what we want to share, you want us to be willing to share everything. To make this happen, I will be working with the treasurer to ensure that financial information is shared with the groups in a manner that you can read, not just in summary.

You need to hear from us what goes on at BOD and BOA meetings. Not just after the fact, but as we prepare for and hold the meetings. You need to be able to contribute to those meetings if you have projects that other groups should know about. To help this happen, I will do my best to post the BOD meeting agenda where you can see it every month. I will make sure that our calendar of meetings is available either on the site and on our Facebook page. I will work with our secretary to make a meeting summary available as soon after the BOD meetings as possible and to share the approved minutes after they are approved.

You want to know what events are going on. Our events will be shared on our Facebook page and on the site. If you wish your meetings to be added to the calendars, we can do that as well.

You want to have access to the BOD meetings. We want this too. I am working on options to make it possible for people to sit in on our meetings so that you know what is going on always.

You want to be able to email the members of both boards. We are working to set up an email account which member groups can use to send suggestions to the BOD and BOA. We will be working to re-design the site to make it more user friendly and better looking. This may include not just a new look, but also search capabilities, forms for connecting with us and each other, and better integration with the other sites we use to share information. What's more, if your group is on Twitter or

Facebook, you can share directly with us there as well.

Every user group needs ideas on ways to grow. We hope to be offering more training and presentations that you can not only attend, but also re-purpose for use with your groups. We will be offering ways for you to publicize your meetings to other groups and to other audiences. There is even the possibility of creating a presence on Flickr and other photography sites for sharing pictures of your events, your groups, your presenters, etc. with the rest of the world.

We know that one of the bigger services we offer to groups currently is our website hosting. With the migration to the new provider, we hope to be able to offer more and better services to you online. We are working with Microsoft and others to offer new services to member groups. Want email for your group? Watch Reports, News, and the site for details on new options. And each of these new services will come with training for those who want it.

The idea is to offer things that will provide big bang for small bucks. We want to do as much as we can with your dues and APCUG's general income and savings. We want to make the organization a place your group feels is worth joining, worth staying with, and worth recommending.

That's what's in the works. What I don't know is if this is what you as user groups want from us. I know that we have become less of a service organization lately. My overall goal is to keep all member groups better informed and to listen better to what you want us to offer. That means your next job is to let us know what of these ideas you like and what else you would like to see from APCUG. Got ideas? Send them in. You may also find that one of your members has invested in Wireless Access for his laptop for business purposes, and who might be willing to let you use his/her laptop and Wireless Access on meeting nights.

Speakers Bureau

A number of speakers are prepared to offer Remote Presentations to APCUG Member Groups using the internet. If you have wired broadband internet available where you meet this should be easy. If all you have is WiFi I recommend we run a test before scheduling a presentation to be sure there is sufficient bandwidth for a presentation.

Right now we have 3 speakers, with a total of 33 possible programs, but we would like to expand this list before we roll the service out. Do you have a member of your UG that has put together well received programs, who might be willing to repeat them for other UGs across the country, all from the comfort of his home computer, especially if it would mean he would not have to come up with all of the new programs, and that your UG could have presentations from people all over the country.

Webinars

We will be selecting presentations from the list and doing them in a Webinar fashion, where multiple groups can watch at the same time to permit Program Chairmen to preview some of these presentations, and that would be a good time to test, or you can contact dsingleton@apcug.org to arange a short test before your meeting starts.





Sharing large files

Sharing large files with someone in your office isn't difficult. Sharing big files with nearby friends and family is also fairly easy.

But when recipients are scattered around the country, things are more difficult.

You shouldn't send huge files via e-mail. That's bad etiquette because it slows recipients' e-mail. You could also reach the inbox's storage quota. Or, an Internet service provider could strip the large attachments.

So, if you have files to share, try filemail. You can upload up to 2 gigabytes of data. It can be in multiple files.

Then, enter your recipients' e-mail addresses and a message. They will get an e-mail so they can download the files.

You can set time and download limits on the files. Also, the files are encrypted when they're uploaded to ensure privacy.

Program Chair's Job Can Be Easier

The common dilemma of all of us who are the Program Chairs of our user group is to find people to present and presentations that will draw attendees to our meetings. Can you relate? I have a few ideas that I have used and wish to share them with you.

The Time magazine person of the year is the head of Facebook, which has over 500,000 users. I have found that the non-technical computer users are huge fans of Facebook, while my fellow user group members are not. Those that do use the service have limited knowledge about what is available and how to set up the security. I am finding that other groups that I belong to are using Facebook extensively.

I decided to do a presentation on "How I use Facebook" and demonstrated sharing old photos, and I do mean old, and share them with friends that I haven't seen in 40 or 50 years. I started by setting up a new account and showed how easy it is. I then went to my real account and looked at photos that I uploaded, photos that my friends uploaded, my wall and items that I and my friends have posted, illustrating the diversity of the users.

Although I don't play the games on FB, I did mention that most of my friends are hooked on some of the available games. I also showed how to find friends and how to invite them to join your list. You or another member could choose your favorite activities on Facebook and show how to use them.

At another meeting I went through all of the security settings and explained what they did and didn't do. We certainly want to help protect our members who use FB. As you can see, there are many aspects of Facebook that can be used for presentations. In some cases, if there is enough interest from your group, a SIG or a Facebook page might be in order.

There are other things that I have tried. I have attended events called BarCamp, which are 1 or 2 day get-togethers of mostly technology people but with no schedule. Think of attending a 1 day conference that had no scheduled sessions in 2 to 4 tracts and the schedule is made up throughout the day from volun-

teers attending and placing their session name on a board.

I didn't go quite that far, but invited member to prepare a 5 minute presentation on some program that they used, some problem that they solved, a web site that they found useful, or some peripheral that they have found. The following month I had several members that came prepared. Each member had about 5 minutes which elicited a good dialog among the attendees before going to the next person and topic.

I have also solicited any computer store or computer consultant that I know to share a topic with our group. We have had some accept and more are also doing so. One of our favorite programs has come from members and non-members who share with us their "Swiss Army Knife" of utilities that they use. Most of the utilities are free programs and our attendees pick up a lot of ideas and tips. We have done this with several meetings and with different people.

You should make a web page available and have each of the presenters list the demoed utilities or programs and links to where to go to get more information or to download them. This lets the attendees concentrate on the presentation and not worry about jotting down a long web address. I maintain a webpage on my personal site with links to a few years of past meetings of my Windows SIG. Answer: The intended purpose brought up the issue of censorship. The bug caused an early version to post follow-ups of its own messages to everyone in the group(s), in other words it created SPAM.

6. In April, 1993 version 1.0 of a little piece of software that changed what computers do was released. What was the program?

Answer: The web browser Mosaic 1.0 was released.

eBook Readers Bruce J. Preston Mid-Hudson Computer User Group http://www.mhcug.org

Bruce J. Preston described and compared various eBook readers.

Bruce demonstrated Amazon Kindle 2, Apple iPad and Sony Reader (Daily Edition.) Images of the various devices were projected onto a large screen. His presentation included the text-to-speech capabilities of the Kindle and iPad.

Bruce described and demonstrated Calibre, free software that can read and/or convert various eBook formats. It is available for Windows, Mac and Linux. He also described NetLibrary (eAudioBooks,) Project Gutenberg (free eBooks) LibriVox (free audiobooks) and NLS/Bard. He gave a very quick demonstration of how to create your own eBooks ready for publishing on Amazon using Word and a free utility program from a subsidiary of Amazon. The resultant book could have been processed by the Kindle's text-to-speech.

Richie Nayman, WPCUG's president showed us the 12 Steps of PC Maintenance. Most people think a computer is like a car that you have to bring in for an annual tune-up. Greetings Region 12

In late August, I became APCUG's Region 12 APCUG Advisor, elected to replace Karen Hart, who resigned in May. My APCUG bio gives brief information about me and my LinkedIn profile http://www.linkedin.com/in/gabegold describes me in more detail.

For 5 1/2 years through December 2009, I was Region 2 -- DC/DE/MD/NJ/VA -- Advisor, so AK/HI/ID/MT/NV/OR/WA/WY has definitely been a change of scenery for me (not that I've yet managed to travel there from where I live, near Washington, DC). Prior to my being assigned their states, Region 12 user group members might have seen articles of mine distributed via APCUG's PUSH service for newsletter editors.

I knew I'd have a bit more trouble visiting Region 12 groups than I did traveling in Region 2 -- where I'm based -- but I've very much enjoyed reading Region 12 newsletters and Web sites, and getting to know group leaders, even at a distance.

Because APCUG's user group database wasn't fully working, I contacted Region 12 people by various means, including using an addressee list compiled by a colleague from user group Web sites.

I'd like Region 12 groups to keep me posted on doings, to add me to newsletter mailing lists (postal or email), and let me know of interests/concerns/suggestions regarding APCUG.

General Tips

Having been an Advisor for a total of six years, I've collected many user group ideas and resources. Since I'm (re)introducing myself in this Reports issue, and since an important Advisor function is cross-pollinating the user group community with ways to succeed and benefit members and communities, I'll recap some points here and continue in future issues.

- o Some of the most successful user groups I've seen have strong social components along with their meetings, classes, support, and other technical offerings. Regular "lunch bunch" gatherings let people get to know each other more than they can simply sitting quietly in conference rooms. Holiday and seasonal events/meetings/parties/ potlucks let people share more of their lives than just recent gadget acquisitions and technology woes.
- While over the last decade or more, many groups' memberships have shrunk -- sometimes by 80& or more!
 -- a few groups have not just survived but prospered.
 That doesn't happen by accident: with brutal competition for people's time and money, it takes more than luck to maintain membership. Groups successful at this pay close attention to three key activities: recruiting, retention,

- and reclamation. And these are DIFFERENT, requiring differing programs and incentives. Members are recruited by public outreach -- meeting publicity, presentations to community groups such as libraries and chambers of commerce, presence at community activities/expos/ conferences, mentions/quotes in local newspapers, etc. But a powerful recruiting tool -- member referrals -- is often sadly neglected. That's too bad, since a person is likely to join if someone they respect urges them to. Groups offering member recruitment bonus or incentives understand this. Rewards needn't be expensive -- I've seen one-month membership extensions, USB drives, and other perks motivate members to actively recruit. The second requirement, retention, requires offering good reasons for belonging -- while some people will cheerfully renew out of habit or loyalty, most people think about membership benefits every time their membership expires. So remember the retention power of members-only benefits: extra newsletter content, enhanced raffles, discounts on group or local vendor offerings, access to group help lines, etc. Visibility and praise is valuable: it doesn't take much newsletter or Web space to list expiring/new/renewed members but such lists can encourage people to remain. Finally, former members often rejoin when they see that a group has evolved and improved to meet current needs. Groups with reasonable membership databases can often generate lists of everyone whose membership lapsed in the past -- say -- 10 years. Certainly many people will have moved, lost interest, passed on. But simply contacting former members and inviting them to return can return valuable benefits.
- o Having members, of course, isn't the point of a user group. It's nice to have ample dues-paying members, but groups need people doing things for members, and need members participating in activities. Some groups track attendance and reward the most loyal members. Others conduct members-only raffles.
- It's challenging staffing user groups and frustrating when the supply of ideas exceeds people willing to pursue them. A very successful way to maintain a steady supply of volunteers is to make volunteer wrangling someone's assigned task -- for example, by designating a Director of Volunteers. This person can create job descriptions and target individuals suitable for various one-time or ongoing tasks. It's especially gratifying and useful for groups to recognize "Volunteer of the Month" (or quarter, or year, or decade!) highlighting how people have contributed to and supported their group. Most importantly: Don't, don't, don't present volunteer opportunities as requiring great personal sacrifice offering no benefits. When I've been asked why I volunteer in various groups and how I can spend so much time on community activities, I always reply that the more I contribute, the more I benefit. I certainly don't volunteer JUST for benefits accrued, but neither do I discount rewards such as making friends, developing contacts valuable in solving problems, meeting vendors providing classes, discounts, beta tests, and such. A timely article by Paul Braget, OMUG President, in the group's December newsletter (http://www.olymug).

org/>, titled "A happier, Longer Life? Volunteer!" sums it up nicely, noting, "...there are now studies showing that people who volunteer at least two hours a week do in fact receive health benefits from volunteering". And, of course, user groups need leaders. It's unfortunate when groups depend on a few key players, since that can lead to individual burnout and sudden loss of key programs. While it's a chore easily postponed, creating job descriptions, succession plans, and strongly encouraging members to step and volunteer -- even in small ways -- is critical to long-term organizational health.

- Besides needing leaders, members, and volunteers, user groups need money to survive, let alone offer meaningful membership benefits and community services. Because that's sometimes hard to do on membership dues alone, out-of-the-box fundraising is necessary. Some groups sell Entertainment discount coupon books (www.entertainment.com); I just helped a community organization raise about \$2,000 by selling these. Books are sold from August through December for discounts the following year; if you're interested in selling 2012 books starting August 2011, let me know. A strikingly creative Fredericksburg, VA user group <www.fpcug.org> program uses Bingo events to achieve financial independence, security, and fund local community services.
- o Creativity begets activity. In February 2010, the Florida Association of Computer User Groups (www.facug.org) ran a very successful technology conference/cruise from Miami to The Bahamas; they're running another cruise in January 2011 from Tampa to Cozumel. I very much enjoyed sailing on the first and will sail on the second. Groups near seaports offering cruises might consider collaborating on such an event to bring in people interested in technology who've never considered joining -- or never even noticed -- tech groups in their communities. I'd certainly find Pacific Northwest cruises alluring!
- o Collaboration allows groups to do things together that they might not accomplish individually -- as, for example, several DC-area groups have shared purchasing, maintaining, and insuring expensive meeting presentation equipment. Partnering needn't be limited to similar groups with "UG" initials. Seeking non-traditional partners such as libraries, genealogy groups, Lifelong Learning Institutes, AARP and NARFE chapters, senior communities, and community centers, can lead to synergies in meeting sites, publicity, newsletter content, newsletter distribution (online it's free, why not?), etc. And speakers who might not book for a small group with a few dozen attendees can be more attracted to a joint meeting with many times more attendees.
- Over the years, SIG membership may have dwindled because topics addressed haven't tracked people's interests. But it's hard to imagine that timely/lively meetings discussing hot topics in Windows (7!), Office (2010!), Linux, genealogy, photography, etc. won't draw crowds. Especially if you offer expert presentations, problem-solving panels, mutual support settings, vendor/ publisher discounts, SIGs can be the powerhouse that rejuvenates user groups.

I can tell just from looking at that URL that you signed up with a UK ISP called Multimania with the user name of "ebayaccountss" (two "s"s), and neither Ebay or Paypal send emails with links that you are to click, in fact both warn their customers never to click a link in an email to reach their sites.

Well, "Mr Evans Green" I am definitely apprehensive about anyone who would think I am stupid enough to think a banker would pick my email address and expect me to assist him in transferring funds out of his bank, even if he had not quoted the balance in dollars rather than pounds sterling or euros, and even if he had not given an email address from yahoo in Hong Kong, while sending the email with a different email address.

My ISP knows that information, so they have no reason to ask me to provide it, and if they want to communicate with me, they would do it from a cox.net or cox.com email address, not one from France.
